Course Description

Laboratory exercises in human integrative physiology. Weekly labs will include hypothesis generation, concept maps of key physiology mechanisms, data collection, data analysis, statistics, clinical correlates, and review of relevant physiological principles. Students will complete weekly assignments on various aspects of human body function and author a grant proposal for a human physiology Capstone project of their own design.

Broad Course Objectives

- Integrate physiological concepts to understand whole body function.
- Think critically to generate weekly experimental hypotheses and perform appropriate data analysis and statistics.
- Design a novel Capstone experiment in physiology.

• Practice professional skills.

Prerequisite:

PSL 431

What to do for a Planned Excused Absence:

- 1. Notify teaching staff by email ASAP (MUST BE MORE THAN 24hrs IN ADVANCE OF ABSENCE).
 - a. Include your TA, Lab Manager, and Dr. Wehrwein on this email.
- 2. Plan to attend another section of the class or complete an asynchronous makeup lab. *
 - a. Asynchronous makeup labs must be completed by the start of the section's next class period except where grief absence or other university-sanctioned accommodations allow more time.
 - b. A summary of makeup lab expectations will be distributed through email by the managing member of the teaching team to you, your TA, and Dr. Wehrwein.
- 3. Post-lab assignments following an absence will be due at their regular time at the start of the section's next class period.
 - a. In the event of an absence, the post-lab assignment will not be released until a makeup assignment has been submitted. Therefore, although the makeup assignment and post-lab assignment are due at the start of the following class period, the makeup

assignment will need to be submitted first, then complete and submit the post-lab assignment.

*You CANNOT have an excused absence then attend another class session without prior approval.

Unplanned Excused Absences:

Retroactive instructor approval required following provision of documentation. In case of emergency, tend to your situation first and obtain documentation later. An emergency would mean PSL 475L is very low on your list of immediate concerns; we have been there, and we understand.

- Family, personal, or pet emergency
- Hospitalization
- Car accident/malfunction
- Documented illness

What to do for an Unplanned Excused Absence:

- 1. Notify teaching staff by email ASAP (email us immediately before, during, or after class.)
 - a. Include your TA, Lab Manager, and Dr. Wehrwein on this email.
- 2. *Plan to attend another section of the class or complete an asynchronous makeup lab.
 - a. Asynchronous makeup labs must be completed by the start of the section's next class period except where grief absence or other university-sanctioned accommodations allow more time.
 - b. A summary of expectations will be distributed by the managing member of the teaching team to you, your TA, and Dr. Wehrwein.
- 3. Post-lab assignments following an absence will be due at their regular time at the start of the section's next class period.
 - a. In the event of an absence, the post-lab assignment will not be released until a makeup assignment has been submitted. Therefore, although the makeup assignment and post-lab assignment are due at the start of the following class period, the makeup assignment will need to be submitted first, then complete and submit the post-lab assignment.

*You CANNOT have an unplanned excused absence then attend another class session without prior approval.

Unexcused absences:

Examples include but are not limited to:

- Overslept
- Work conflict
- Busy week
- Exam in another class
- Overwhelmed

What to do for an Unexcused Absence:

- 1. *Notify the teaching staff by email ASAP after the miss.
 - a. Include your TA, Lab Manager, and Dr. Wehrwein on this email.

- b. Asynchronous makeups for unexcused absences must be initiated by Thursday at 5pm on the same week of the absence. Requests made after 5pm Thursday will not be accepted and a zero will be entered for the in-lab and post-lab assignments.
- 2. Complete the <u>asynchronous</u> makeup lab for <u>partial</u> points recovery. Limit **ONE (1)** makeup for an unexcused absence per semester. You will complete the full asynchronous lab activity on your own asynchronous document. This makeup document is due at the start of your section's next class period to the appropriate submission box on D2L. Up to 80% of maximal possible in class points allowed (20% penalty). Weekly post-lab assignment will be released and submitted as normal following submission of the makeup assignment.
 - a. You are limited to **ONE** (1) unexcused absence makeup per semester. Any further unexcused absences will result in an automatic zero for the in-lab and post-lab assignments.
 - b. A summary of expectations will be distributed by the managing member of the teaching team to you, your TA, and Dr. Wehrwein.

*You CANNOT miss class and attend another class session or makeup lab session. Unexcused absences are strictly limited to ONE (1) unexcused absence eligible for makeup per semester. In extreme circumstances, professor discretion may be considered for an additional excused or unexcused absence. Outside of such a circumstance, no exceptions.

Grading Policy

Grading schedule: 2110 Total Possible Points

Weekly: (1160 points total for weekly labs in the semester)

Pre-Lab:

- 8 Pre-Lab PlayPosit Video Lectures or Pre-Lab activity (10 points each, 80 points total)
 - Due before class via system-recorded timestamp. If the last question is not timestamped (D2L auto-updates) BEFORE your class session starts, you will not receive the 4 points towards this in the in-class participation section (see below; exceptions made for absences, etc.).

In-Lab:

- 8 In Class Lab Session Points, 35 pts per class session (280 points total)
 - 5 Professionalism points for coming to class prepared and on time (complete the prelab video/quiz BEFORE class AND arrive on time; attendance via completing QR code attendance poll)
 - Late arrivals will lose the 5 professionalism points.
 - Later than 10 minutes will result 1 point deduction from the remaining 30 inclass points for every 10 minutes of absence.

Grade Dissemination:

Grading Scale:

The table below describes the relationships between grades and percentages. The first column describes the grade. The second column describes the percentage range associated with that grade. The third column describes the number of points required for that grade.

Late passes for weekly assignments

Assignments must be turned in on time (at or before the start of the next class period) to receive credit for the assignment. Make it a habit to double-check that you submitted the correct document to D2L prior to the deadline. Typically, assignments are graded one to seven days after a due date, so if you wait to receive an alert of zero points for a grade entered one week after the deadline, it may be too late to receive any credit for it.

The exception to this policy is that each student is granted **two** assignment extension passes:

- One 24-hour extension pass
- One 1-week extension pass
- You do not need to get permission from the teaching team to use these two extensions, but you
 MUST indicate you are using an extension pass when submitting your assignment to D2L by
 adding a comment to the comment box of your submission on D2L.
 - When you upload/submit the assignment to D2L you must add a note that states "Using one of my (24-hour or 1-week) free extensions" in the D2L submission comments box.
 - o If you do not add your late pass comment to the box, a late pass will NOT be applied.
 - Email your TA to let them know you submitted a late assignment to be graded.
- The teaching staff will track your passes.
- These extensions may be applied to any of the following:
 - Post-lab weekly assignments
 - Human Subjects reflection essay
 - Pulmonary Excel Graph
 - "Preparing for Next Steps" Assignment
 - Lay Summary Assignment
- You are advised to save extensions for an unanticipated event that prevents you from submitting an assignment on time.
- You may not take back a previously used extension pass to use on a new assignment or "share" your passes with anyone else.
- You are encouraged to turn in all assignments, even if they have a late penalty (i.e., you have used
 your late passes, or it is more than one week late). You can submit any assignment for a penalty
 grade until the last day of classes, Friday at 5pm the week before finals.

Other Course Policies

Alternate Course Modality Due to University or Government Mandates:

Should it be necessary, in the event we can no longer hold in-person classes, we will use synchronous Zoom classes as an alternative.

Zoom Attendance Policy:

Class will run as an interactive, synchronous session over Zoom. Attendance is mandatory. Attendance and participation points will be earned by being on time, actively engaged in course activities, and successfully completing in-class checkoffs which occur multiple times during the class session. Makeup labs are required for excused absences and must be completed within 7 days of missed class. Makeup labs must be completed to be eligible to submit the weekly homework assignment.

Accommodation will be made for students with excused absences or documented emergencies, but these require timely communication with the instructor over email when there is a conflict or emergency.

• Zoom Requirements:

Log-in a few minutes before the start of class to ensure that you get the attendance points for being on time. A Zoom poll will launch at the exact start time of class that you must answer for attendance. Cameras are not required for participation but are highly recommended. Using cameras during group work has been shown to result in better group performance. Although cameras are not required, speaking participation is required. You must have a microphone capability available. Participation in class activities is required for points and will be checked off during the session. All inclass activities must be completed and checked-off before leaving for the day.

COVID Attendance Policy:

<u>IF YOU ARE SICK, DO NOT COME TO CLASS.</u> If you are sick (especially if you have COVID) please stay home and make arrangements for a makeup lab; this includes both in-person and Zoom classes. **The class makeup policies still apply.** 24-hour advance notice of an absence is required to be eligible for a makeup lab outside of emergent situations (see "<u>Learning Continuity</u>" statement and "<u>Makeup Labs</u>" above).

Class Cancellation Policy:

Should class need to be cancelled, the teaching team will communicate if there will be an alternative class session (online, etc.) or dropped grades from the final grade calculation to accommodate a classwide closure.

The final exam is a take home format. You will have one week to complete it. Details on format will be given at the end of the semester.

Participation in Human Subjects Research:

We will be collecting data in class, which necessitates someone in your team to be a "subject." As is the case for all studies involving human subjects, you are not required to participate as a subject. If you are in any way uncomfortable about a particular experiment, you can opt-out of being the subject without penalty. If you opt out, you will still need to be in class and will serve as the researcher/observer so that you have data for your lab report. This does not relieve you of obligations to participate in class, take the quiz, write the lab report, or participate in class discussions.

Use of Turnitin[™]:

Student submissions will be retained only in the MSU repository hosted by Turnitin.

Our school encourages anyone experiencing sexual misconduct to talk to someone about what happened, so they can get the support they need, and our school can respond appropriately.

If you wish to speak confidentially about an incident of sexual misconduct, want more information about filing a report, or have questions about school policies and procedures, please contact our Title IX Coordinator, which can be found on our school's website.

Our school is legally obligated to investigate reports of sexual misconduct, and therefore it cannot guarantee the confidentiality of a report, but it will consider a request for confidentiality and respect it to the extent possible.

As a teacher, I am also required by our school to report incidents of sexual misconduct and thus cannot guarantee confidentiality. I must provide our Title IX coordinator with relevant details such as the names of those involved in the incident.

FAQ

When is my homework due if I complete a makeup lab?

Homework, inclusive of makeup labs, is due at the start of your section's next class period. Otherwise, late penalties apply as outlined in the syllabus.

What if I cannot attend another section of the lab following an absence?

There will be an asynchronous makeup option for anyone who cannot attend the live makeup option **following any excused absence or ONE (1) unexcused absence**. This requires all in-class work to be done on your own, so it is not the preferred option. It would be best to attend a session where discussions can take place with peers and the staff.

Is attendance in class really mandatory or can I do as many make up labs as I want?

ATTENDANCE IS MANDATORY! Makeup labs are limited to excused absences and ONE unexcused absence per semester. You will not earn in class or post-lab points if you do not attend or make up a class.

How do I get help? Who should I contact?

The instructors for PSL 475 are always happy to help you. Your TA is your main contact for this course.

- A. For issues with class, physiology content, or grading, contact your TA by email.
- B. For other issues regarding absences, other personal matters, or if you have any issues with your lab partner or TA, Dr. Wehrwein would be glad to help you and you should email her anytime.

When are office hours?

There are not fixed office hours because junior/senior students are very busy with different schedules, as are our TAs. Therefore, we have email availability anytime or will gladly set up a custom office hour for your needs. You can contact your TA or Dr. Wehrwein at any time. We encourage this.

CODE OF CONDUCT

I. CLASS ATTENDANCE: I understand that class attendance is mandatory. PSL 475L is a "handson" course where the primary benefit is gained through in-class activities whether held online or in
person.

a. BE ON TIME:

- i. I agree that it is unacceptable to arrive late to class and understand that I will lose the weekly professionalism points if I arrive late. Not only does this disrupt my instructor and fellow students, but it puts my lab partner(s) at a disadvantage.
- ii. I agree to be ON-TIME to class, unless I contact Dr. Wehrwein, my TA, and my lab partner(s) ahead of time OR, if due to extenuating circumstances, establish communication as soon as possible.
- iii. I also understand that it is unacceptable to leave class early unless my group is finished with the exercise/presentation/problem set and dismissed. Points will be deducted from my assignment if I leave without completing the daily activity.

b. MISSING LAB AND MAKEUP LAB POLICIES:

- i. Makeup labs are offered at no penalty for <u>planned</u> and <u>excused</u> absences. I understand that I can make up a missed lab ONLY if I have a legitimate excused absence as determined by the professor and let them know <u>at least 24 hours before</u> the lab for planned absences or have a documented emergency that is communicated ASAP. The 24-hr advance notice also applies to missing a scheduled makeup lab.
- ii. I must have appropriate written documentation (e.g., a doctor's note, medical school interview) that has been <u>approved</u> by Dr. Wehrwein and I must <u>complete</u> the makeup lab to get credit for the week's lab.
- iii. I understand that it is *my* responsibility to coordinate a makeup lab and initiate this communication with the teaching staff before 5pm Friday on the <u>same</u> week of the absence or receive an automatic zero for the lab and associated weekly assignment (unless otherwise protected by university policy, i.e., grief absence). When completing the asynchronous makeup, I understand that it must be completed and submitted to D2L by the normal assignment due date for my section.
- iv. A post-lab assignment *cannot* be turned in without completing the lab session or makeup lab.
- v. An unexcused absence from a makeup lab will result in an automatic zero for the lab and associated post-lab assignment.

II. CLASS WORK ETHIC:

- **a. BE PREPARED:** I agree to have watched the pre-lab lecture, taken the quiz, and completed any assigned readings ahead of time so that I am prepared during my scheduled class period.
- b. WORK AS A TEAM: I agree to work as an equal team with my lab partner(s), and that I will show up on time and be prepared for class. If a problem arises, I promise to contact my instructor as soon as possible. Although we work in class as a team, I understand that all assignments submitted for individual grading must be my own genuine work.
- c. LATE ASSIGNMENTS: Weekly post-lab assignments are due at the BEGINNING of the next lab period. "Late" means any time after the start of the next class period for my section. If I miss the assignment submission folder deadline, there are TWO things I should do: 1) I will submit the assignment to the assignment submission folder in D2L (applying a late pass, if available); AND 2) I will also email my TA and the lab manager to notify them of the late assignment submission to ensure it will be graded in a timely manner. In this email, note if you are using your 24 hour or 1-week late pass for this weekly assignment for posterity. Your late pass MUST be applied in the comments of your submission.

- i. **Late passes:** There are two late passes for each student to earn full points on late work. One 24-hour late pass and one 7-day/1-week late pass. These may only be used for eligible assignments as specified in the syllabus.
- i. Additional late weekly assignments or penalties for any other late assignments: Late assignments will be deducted 5% of the earned points for each day late until 75% is reached. After five days late, an assignment can only achieve 75% of the earned points but will not be deducted further. All late assignments in this category must be submitted the Friday of the last week of classes by 5pm (i.e., the week before finals week).
- ii. You are encouraged to turn in all assignments, even if they have a late penalty! You can submit any assignment for a penalty grade until the last day of classes Friday at 5pm (week before finals).

III. MUTUAL RESPECT:

- a. I agree to give my full attention during class so that I can get the most out of class and group work. I agree that the use of a cell phone and/or other internet device for non-academic reasons during class is unacceptable.
- b. I agree to actively participate in group work during breakout rooms or group work.

IV. ACADEMIC INTEGRITY:

- a. DEFINITION: "Plagiarism is copying another person's text or ideas and passing the copied material as your own. It is your responsibility to make certain that you understand the difference between quoting and paraphrasing, as well as the proper way to cite and delineate quoted material." https://ombud.msu.edu/academic-integrity/plagiarism-policy.html
- **b. GENERAL:** I understand that PSL475L holds a zero-tolerance policy to academic dishonesty (which includes plagiarism). This will result in action taken against me: ranging from a penalty grade to failing the course, filing an Academic Dishonesty Report with the MSU Registrar's office, and/or a hearing with the Associate Dean's office.
- c. CITING: Direct quotes from articles, websites, peers, or other sources will <u>not</u> be accepted even if in quotation marks and followed by a citation unless you are specifically instructed to do so. Use <u>extreme caution</u> when re-phrasing or paraphrasing; most paraphrasing is indeed plagiarism and not actually paraphrasing. Text that is highly similar to a source other than you will be flagged and penalties will be assessed. All answers submitted must be in your own words.
- d. ASSIGNMENTS: I agree that all forms of academic dishonesty, including but not limited to cheating, copying the work of authors and inappropriately sourcing information on any in/out of class assignments is unacceptable and will result in action taken against me. If I turn in any work (ranging from a paraphrase to a full report) from another individual (a current student, former student, academic, etc.), you will get a zero on that assignment, must write a reflective essay, will be reported to the academic integrity office, and will need to take an online course on academic honesty. Turning in the work on another as your own is considered a serious offense by the university and will not be tolerated.
- e. **ChatGPT AND AI:** ChatGPT and other AI should be viewed as a "really smart friend." This means you can consult with it, discuss with it, and seek explanations or clarifications about topics covered in this course. However, it must be used within the same boundaries as you would use a human in an academic setting everything graded in this course must be generated by your own intelligence. You may not copy or paraphrase the words of your friend or AI and use them as your own.
